Town Clerk News

Starting July 5, the Town Clerk's hours will be 10:30 AM - 3 PM each Wednesday, 6-8 PM on the second and fourth Mondays of the month, and by appointment.

The following is a brief summary of the major actions voted at the annual Town Meeting in June.

- Voters approved the annual Town budget totaling \$1,400, 000, and the use of \$100,000 of free cash to lower the tax rate to \$19.00+
- After a lengthy discussion, the Gateway school budget was defeated. Chester was the third Town to vote down the budget, forcing the school system to present another budget within 30 days.
- Voters adopted the "stretch energy code", which is an addition to the Town's building code. It affects only new home construction, and requires more energy efficient construction. It also makes available to the town at least \$135,000 in grant money to improve the energy efficiency of town buildings, and designates Chester as a "green community".
- A new dog by-law was passed. The by-law spells out the regulations regarding the owner's responsibility to keep the dog under control at all times. It defines a nuisance dog, and it creates a list of fines for failing to adhere to the law. Copies of this by-law are available from the Town Clerk upon request. It is in effect as of July 1, 2017.
- Voters approved special articles that would rescind the annual town caucus, dedicate money to improve the town's website, and begin a vital records preservation project.
- A citizen petition proposing that the Town undertake a feasibility study for the sale of CMELD was unanimously defeated.
