The State Election is scheduled for Tuesday, November 6. If you are not already registered to vote, the last day to register so that you can vote in this election is Wednesday, October 17. You can register to vote **in person** at the Town Clerk's office during regular office hours on Monday evenings from 6-8 pm and Wednesdays from 10:30 am - 4PM, **by mail** Mail-in forms are available at the Town Hall, the Chester Post Office, and the library or **Online**- visit www.sec.state.ma.us and click on the button for Elections and Voting. There will be an Early Voting Period before this election, which will include evening and weekend times that you can vote. The schedule for early voting will be printed in October. If you need an absentee ballot for this election, please contact the Town Clerk at 354-6603 or by email at chestertown-clerk@comcast.net. NOTE - Because of this event the November monthly meeting will be held on November 10 at 9 AM at the Historic Museum. **Bits and pieces:** DID YOU KNOW that "back in the day" when the Chester Community Development Planning Committee composed of John Baldasaro, Donald Ellershaw, Richard Hozman, Terry Murphy, Andrew Myers and Fay Piergiiovanni was active; a study was made which included 76 sites in Chester that had natural resource potentials. The study was done with funding from the Commonwealth of Mass with Technical assistance provided by the PVPV. Statement was: "We the residents of Chester aim to preserve our rural community character and scenic beauty while striving to balance residential growth and economic development with our service and infrastructure needs."
